Spring Recruitment

We participate in three spring school events to show our presence in the school and community as well as recruit potential Scouts.

Time Line

February – Reserve spot for the wellness health fair at Red Pine.

Reach out to Pinewood and Northview's PTO to ask about participation in the carnival.

March – Come up with a craft for the Red Pine Health Fair.
 Choose some games to bring to the Pinewood Health Fair.
 Typically, the Northview Carnival has us run game stations they have already set up.
 Recruit Parents to help cover these events

Red Pine Set up

Craft Ideas: key find game, making stress balls or other Activity Games. Be creative, the kids love doing crafts.

Have a table of Scouts books, shirts, pictures and promotional materials. Have a clip board to take down names of interested Scouts and parents. I would suggest 3-4 parents to help.

Pinewood Carnival

Bring one or two of the skill games the pack has or create another one. The kids gravitate towards fun games; think outside the box. Have candy to pass out as a prize along with a table set up with some scout's pictures and promotional materials. Have a clip board to take down names of interested Scouts and parents. I would suggest 2-3 parents to help

Northview Carnival

Northview carnival is hosted by their PTO. They usually provide either the games or bouncy houses. What they have asked for in the past is to either man the games and provide prizes or run the bouncy houses and cotton candy machine and help donate towards the supplies. Recruiting at least 5 parents to help run the stations and 1-2 parents to help talk to parents and take names and numbers. Have a clip board to take down names of interested Scouts and parents.

Summer Recruitment

Our summer recruitment event is the Rosemount Leprechaun Parade. Each year the bears create a float. The pack will buy candy along with asking parents to donate a bag of candy.

Time Line

June – Reserve the unit's spot in the parade by deadline on application. You can find current applications on http://www.rosemountevents.com/Leprechaun.html

Connect with the district membership chair to get any council district promotional materials.

Follow up with the bear den leaders to make sure they are working on their floats.

Be conscious of the size of the float for what size truck you will need to pull it. Make sure to let the person driving the float know what their parade spot it.

Dear Parents of Potential Cub Scouts.

Pack 455 invites you to consider having your son participate in the Cub Scout program as a member of our pack.

Being mindful not to overwhelm you with information, we'd like to lay out how the program works. The 3 key goals of Cub Scouting are to instill a sense of participating citizenship, positive character development, and personal fitness. All the aspects of the program flow from these goals. The Cub Scout motto is "Do Your Best".

Organizational Structure: We operate as a pack chartered under the Emanuel Lutheran Church, and under the guidance of the Northern Start Council (Chief Black Dog District). The pack is made of age/grade specific groups called dens, typically Kindergartners- Lion Scouts 1st graders-Tiger Cubs, 2nd graders- Wolves, 3rd graders- Bears, 4th and 5th graders- Webelos I and II. Dens have leaders and meet once or twice a month in homes of Scouts while the pack as a whole meets monthly, usually the first Monday of the month at Red Pine Elementary.

Den meetings focus on projects and achievements toward the specific rank the boys are working on. Occasionally dens will have fun field trips to places of interest to the boys. The pack meetings center on one of the 12 character traits (honesty, resourcefulness, etc.).

Uniforms: The basic shirt with emblems, kerchief and slide. The pack provides your emblems and handbook. Caps are optional, as well as the belt and pants. Boys are expected to wear their uniform to den and pack meetings. These can be purchased at the Scout Shop. There are several locations.

Costs: Annual pack dues are \$125 per scout in addition to any camping fees they go on. We do fundraisers throughout the year to help with the cost of Scouts. Wreaths, popcorn and butter braids. 30% of what the scout sell goes into their individual scout account to be used towards any scout cost including dues.

Training: We like to have our leaders receive some training so they feel comfortable in whatever roles they take on. Rank-specific training is available for adults who volunteer to be leaders. All training is available online. Some roles are more of a commitment than others, but it would help to have all adults take the Youth protection training as part of their orientation to scouting and working with young boys. This is a no-cost online training available through the BSA organization.

Camps: One of the highlights of Scouting is attending camp. There are several opportunities through the year. Our pack goes on three family camping trips a year, fall, winter and spring in addition to Day Camp and Resident Camp sponsored by the council.

Volunteering: Our pack does several volunteer activates through the year. As a pack we do bell ringing for the salvation army, caroling at the veterans home, feed my starving children and keeping red pine green (taking care of the grounds of red pine). We encourage our Scouts to volunteer and report their hours.

Family Involvement: Scouting is really a joint adventure with boys and their parents and we need parents to participate in making the pack run smoothly. There are lots of ways to help out. Please fill out the family talent survey kit.

Now that you've made it this far, thank you for considering getting your son involved with Scouting. Scouting is fun with a purpose. We think it is a wonderful program and hope we can make it so for your boy.

After Open House

It is really important after Open House to follow up with each name on the list via email and phone calls.

Events

Open House

The best recruitment is when all the potential Scouts are in one place. Be a part of the open house or other start of school events.



Community Events

Any community events you can be a part of to show the community that you are there is a chance for recruitment. Parades, "community event days" anything that your community does.





Night to Unite

If your neighborhood does night for unite. Have a craft table for kids to do.

Help out your school

Talk to the PTO what your pack can do to help the school. Clean the grounds or help with school's events.

Helpful Community Event

Participate in community events (clean up days, salvation army bell ringing food drive etc.)



Recruitment Table/Area

1) GO BIG IF YOU CAN

Going big will draw attention. If you can put on a big display it is only going to draw kids and parents down to you

2) Bold & Colorful

Going bold and colorful will really draw attention to your table/event

3) Presence (Boys and Leaders in Uniform)

Having leaders and Scouts walking around in uniforms around your event will make them stand out.

4) Information packets

Talk about the fun points of scouting

Boys are really drawn in and paying attention when you talk about thing activities they get to do. Many times there is a misperception of scouting as some boring activity you sit in someone's house and do. When you start to mention camping, archery, bb guns, rockets, pinewood derby, rock climbing etc...you will see their interest start to show.

5) ALWAYS take names and contact information

Make sure to get the parents name and contact information. If you can sign them up on the spot, one less parent to get to SNFS night. Make calls a few days prior to SNFS to remind parents of sign up night. After SNFS make follow up calls and have a second chance for parents to come and sign up at your orientation night.
